COLLEGE PROFILE

Kohima college, a premier educational institution in the state of Nagaland, located in the scenic hillock of Kruoliezou, was established on the 9th of August 1967. The college holds the distinction of being the first private college offering higher education in Arts Stream for the first time in Kohima. It is affiliated to Nagaland University and offers three-year Graduate Degree course in a multitude of Humanities programs. The Commerce stream was successfully introduced in 2016. The government of Nagaland took over Kohima College with effect from 1st February 2006.

It may be mentioned that Kruoliezou, where the college is presently located, is one of the fastest developing sectors in Kohima Town. The present campus covers a total area of 28.27 acres; the college has a three-storied building constituting three blocks with 17 classrooms, 1 Language Laboratory, 1 seminar Hall and an Auditorium. The college has a digitized Library with internet and wifi- facility and also a Book Bank funded by the University Grants Commission.

Kohima College has successfully completed two cycles of assessment (2012 and 2017) by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) Bengaluru and graded B and B+ respectively. The college with its motto 'Search for Excellence' aspires not only to promote quality education but also to inculcate an awareness of fair play, honesty and integrity among the students, motivating them to lead bold, engaged and transformed lives that will add value to our shared community.



GRADUATE PROGRAMMES FOR ARTS AND COMMERCE

The College is affiliated to Nagaland University (NU) and offers admissions for Undergraduate courses in Arts and Commerce Stream. The minimum duration of this course, is 3 years spread over 6 semesters and a maximum of 5 years (10 semesters) The college offers Honours in eight subjects.

To broaden the horizons of education, the University Grants Commission (UGC) introduced and recommended all institutes of higher education to adopt the Choice Based Credit System, (CBCS) an internationally acknowledged system of grading students' performance. CBCS is a student-centric educational model that allows students to choose across inter and intra disciplinary courses. Following the directives from Nagaland University, Kohima College is implementing the CBCS from this academic session, 2022. We believe that the advantages and the effectiveness that CBCS offers will make the students' education more holistic.

For successful completion of the course, students must compulsorily perform all tests, assignments, projects, in all the semesters and earn the credits required for qualification.

Minimum attendance of 75% is the criteria to write the end Semester Examination

ADMISSION POLICY

Admission to Kohima College will follow the principles of the formula devised by the Department of Higher Education 2019. The Formula will be reviewed after a period of 3 (three) years

RESERVATION POLICY

The seats are generally filled up by students from the Scheduled Tribe. The college believes in ensuring just and equal treatment to all students and therefore Category C follows the system where some seats are exclusively reserved for some section of the society. The seats reserved for certain section of the society are listed as under.

1. 5 seats reserved for PWDs.
2. 8 seats reserved for Kohima Village Council. (2 from each khel)
3. 4 seats reserved for founding members.
4. 5 seats reserved for OBCs.
5. 10 seats reserved for students from CBSE.

ACADEMIC RULES

1. A Student must fulfill 75% (NU) attendance.
2. Any student may be debarred from appearing examinations (Internal/External) on account of gross violation of college rules and Regulations, Misconduct, Bad Character, Disrespect to college authority, Faculty, Staff or non- payment of any fees of the college, and Nagaland University.
3. Admission to Honours is prerogative of the college authority/ HOD of the concerned department.

3. DISCIPLINE

- 3.1 Every student shall at all times observe the rules and regulations of the college and shall remain answerable to the college authority for its activity and conduct on the college campus.
- 3.2 Use of cell phones during class hour is strictly prohibited.
- 3.3 Consumption of any form of intoxicating products or smoking or using chewing gum, pan masala etc are strictly prohibited.
- 3.4 Spitting inside the classroom is a punishable offence.
- 3.5 Indulging in immoral or disruptive behaviour and activities within the college campus and hostel is strictly prohibited.
- 3.6 Organising tours/excursions without permission from college authority and without teachers accompanying the students are strictly banned.

4. ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

Academic misconduct is considered a serious offence. A student shall be subject to disciplinary action for any of the following acts:

- 4.1 Using unfair means during exam/tests.
- 4.2 Submitting assignments copied from fellow students.
- 4.3 Using mobile phones other devices with an intend to cheat during exams/ tests.
- 4.4 Habitual negligence of college work.
- 4.5 Absence from internal examination, non submission or late submission of assignments, frequent absence from class etc.

5. LIBRARY

- 5.1 Students are advised to use the library as maximum as possible.
- 5.2 Entry to and exit from the library should be recorded in the Register kept on the counter.
- 5.3 Removing/tearing library materials is prohibited.
- 5.4 Use of mobile phones, iPods etc inside the library is strictly prohibited.
- 5.5 Students are to maintain silence and discipline in the library.

6. ICT & MEDIA

- 6.1 Kohima College owned computers or networks shall not be used for any private or commercial purposes.
- 6.2 Students are prohibited from installing, storing or using unlicensed or pirated software in any college owned computers.
- 6.3 Students are expected to cooperate in ensuring a virus free environment in the college computers.
- 6.4 Students are not allowed to play games from the college computers.
- 6.5 Students are to acknowledge the source/ author whenever internet materials are used for assignments or for any other purpose.
- 6.6 Students are required to check the Notice Board and Website of the college for important announcements.

HOSTEL RULES

1. Hostellers are required to attend classes regularly. No one is allowed to be in the hostel during class hours.
2. Hostellers going out during the day must fill in the details in the day—out register. It is also mandatory to sign while returning.
3. Hostellers must be in the hostel positively by 5:30 pm summer and 5:00 pm winter. Not adhering to these rules may lead to expulsion from the hostel which would automatically mean expulsion from the college.
4. Leave can be availed during weekends with the permission at the warden. However, it must be applied for in advance. Request for leave through telephone will not be entertained under any circumstances.
5. Electrical appliances Iron, heaters, immersion rod, electric kettle etc. are not allowed.
6. Hostellers must be present during attendance time in the evening which will be token daily by the warden or prefect.
7. Hostellers must be in their respective rooms by 7:00 pm.

FACILITIES

Library

- More than 19,000 texts and reference books
- Digitized with internet and wifi facilities
- Book Bank funded by UGC

- Regular subscription to National/ International journals/periodicals, current affairs magazines etc., keeps the library services (The library remains open from 9 a.m-4p.m on all working days)

Hostel– Well-furnished hostels for both boys and girls, within the vicinity of the college campus

Bus facility– The college has three buses for staff and students. It is also available for other activities, as and when required.

Games and Sports– Spacious playground available for football, volleyball, basketball and other athletic events. Indoor stadium for badminton, table tennis, carom, chess, etc.

Music- The college has a choir called the Kohima College Choir, taught by talented music faculty.

Language cum Computer lab– This is a multipurpose facility equipped with internet. The language lab is used for interactive language learning by Functional English students.

Canteen– The college has two canteens that cater to the needs of the staff and students with clean and hygienic food

Safe drinking Water Facility- Clean drinking water filters have been placed in every floor for the students and staff. There is also a Smart Water Dispenser in the campus.

QUALITY MONITORING

Internal Quality Assurance Cell

The IQAC coordinates with all other cells to ensure quality benchmark in all aspects of the college. It is instrumental in planning and monitoring quality assurance and quality enhancement of the college in its mission towards academic excellence.

Admission Committee

The admission committee headed by the Principal, Vice-principal and HoDs monitor the overall admission process. The committee's decision on these issues are final and binding.

Internal Evaluation

Assessment of the students is done through tests, assignments, project works, seminars, peer teaching, the outcome of which is used as a basis for identifying and providing extra care to slow learners through remedial classes.

Attendance

Attendance percentage of every student is monitored monthly. Parents/ guardians of students performing poorly and failing to get the University prescribed 75% in class attendance are called by the Principal to ascertain the reason for irregularity.

Mentoring, Students Counselling and Career Guidance Cell

To make the students academically and socially integrated, this Cell plans out a systematic mentoring program every year to encourage and assure that each student has a faculty (mentor) to fall back on or consult in time of need. It also organises seminars on mental health from time to time, career-oriented programs/ interactions with professionals for the final year students. This is to keep them abreast with up-to-date employment trends and options and to help strengthen their decision-making skills.

GENERAL NORMS

1. Use of Mobile phones/Music players etc. are strictly banned inside the classroom and during examinations
2. Dress Code for students
 - a. In full uniform on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, Friday and all College functions and examination days
 - b. In traditional attire (at least one item) every Wednesday
 - c. Decent dress on non-uniform days. Wearing torn jeans and sandals are discouraged
3. Short hair is mandatory for male students during the course of study in the college
4. Use of tobacco products, alcohol, gambling, and substance abuse, engaging in any forms of harassment, sexual misconduct, damaging or misusing college property is strictly prohibited. Such acts will be liable for action, including immediate expulsion of the student/s from the college or hostel, as deemed fit by the college authority
5. Any form of discrimination towards fellow college students on the basis of tribe, caste, religion etc. shall be dealt with seriously
6. Students must participate in all official activities of the college such as social gatherings, social work, games and sports events etc. Fines will be imposed on the absentees
7. Students should visit the college library regularly for collection of materials and keep themselves updated
8. Tribal organizations within the college are not recognised. Kohima College Students Council (KCSC) is the only recognized student body in the college. Departmental/group excursion, tour and fund raise activities etc., are banned/ not allowed
9. To qualify as a member in the Kohima College Students Council (KCSC), one must clear all semester examinations and attain the required attendance percentage
10. Students must make concerted effort/s to keep their classrooms and surroundings clean.
11. Students should check college Notice Board regularly
12. Students are expected to read and familiarise themselves with the contents of the Students' Handbook given to them on joining the college.

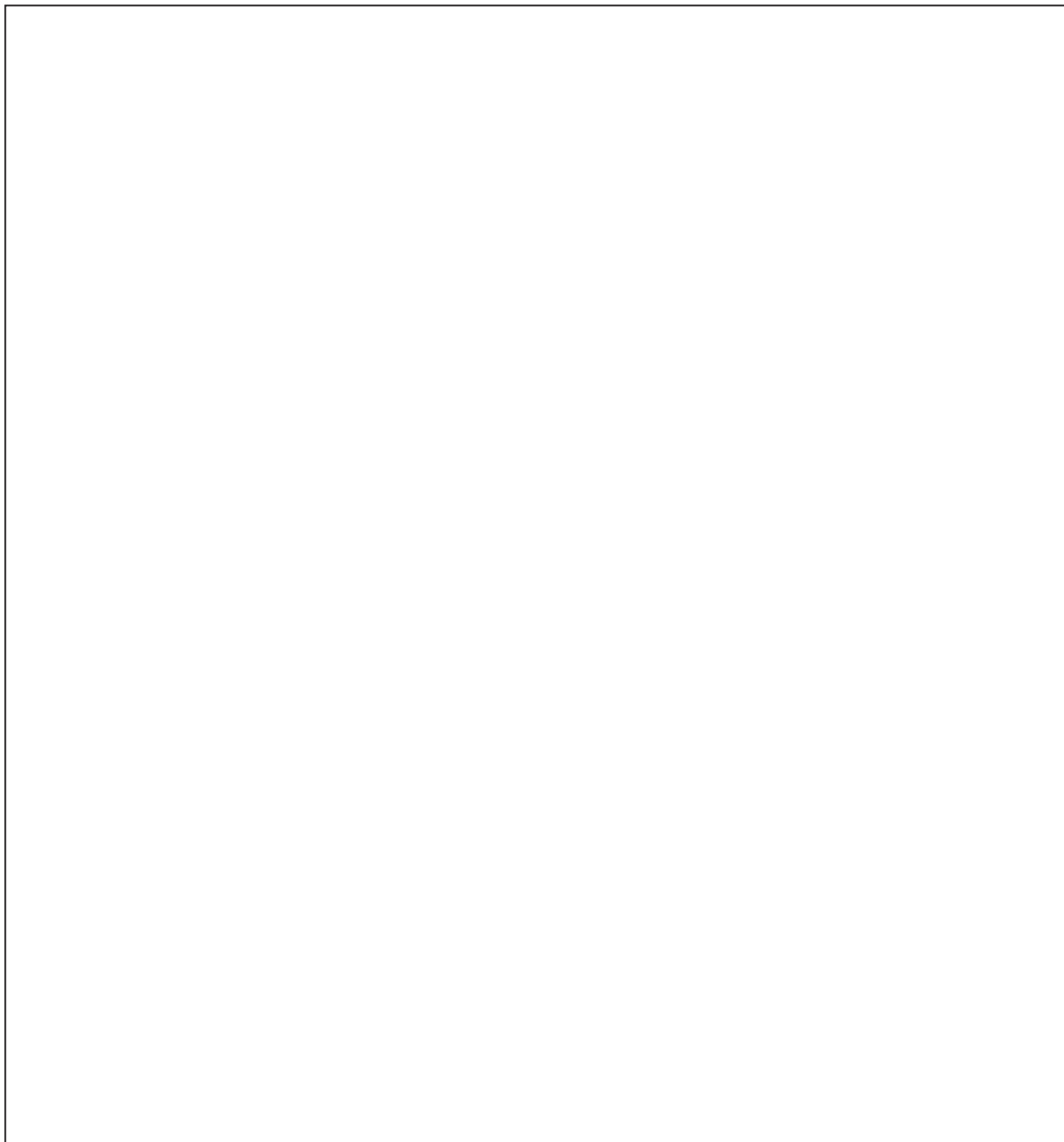

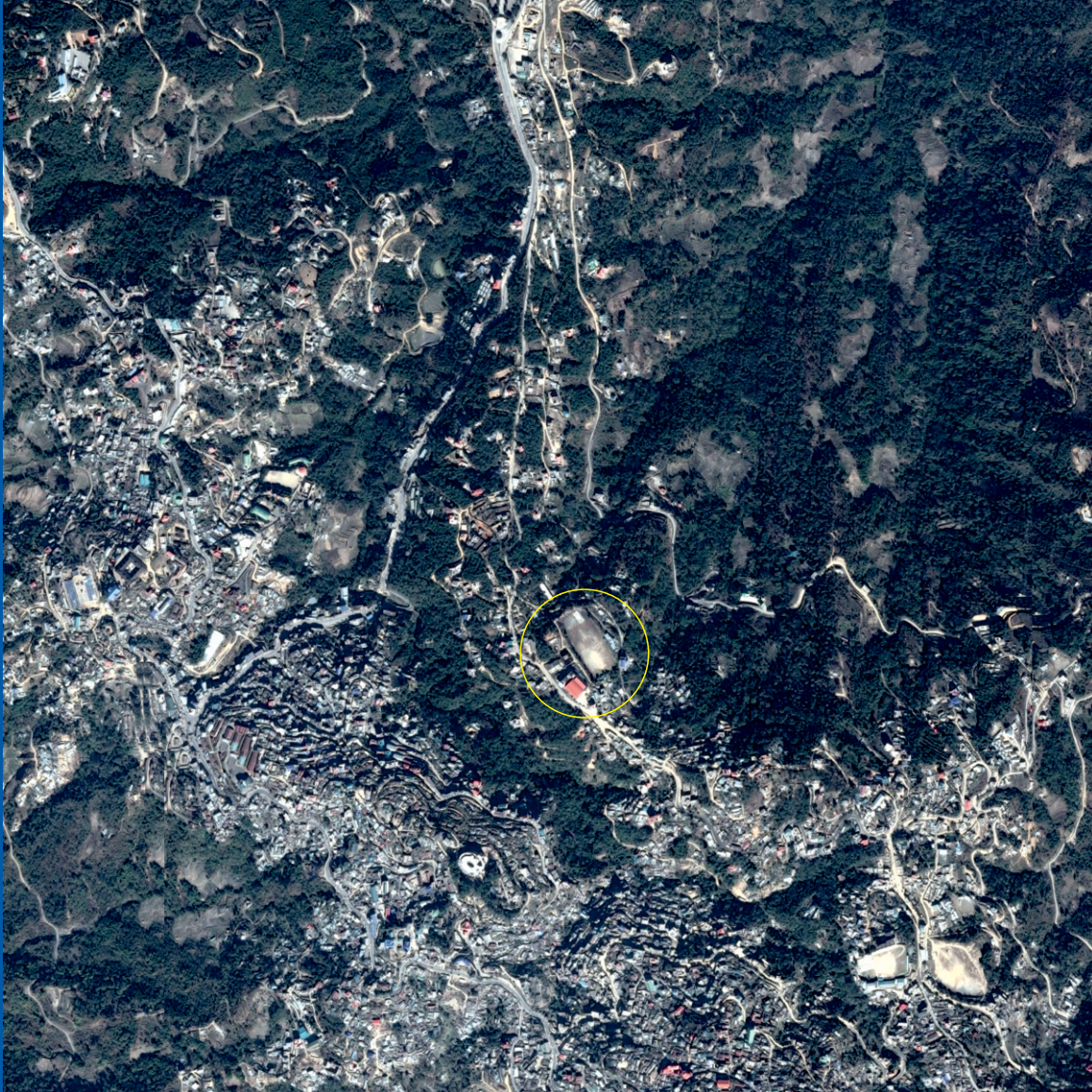
