A press release by KCK mass nedia 'cell' stafed 'that' the workshop was held on three technical sessions. "IPR and its component: overview of IPR", "copyright and trademark", and on "geographical indications - opportunities and challenges".

#### Report on 'Intellectual Property Rights'

A one day seminar on Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) organized by QAC, Kohima College, Kohima in collaboration with Patent Information Cent (PIC), Nagaland State Science and Technology (NASTEC), Govt. of India with held on 17th April, 2021, at the Conference room, KCK.

Madam Sungjemminla, Assistant Professor, Department of English inaugurated the sess sion and introduced the three resource persons, Dr. Nesatalu inaugurated the session and introduced the three resource persons, Dr. Nesanau-Hiese, Scientist-D. Patent Information Centre, Nagaland Science Technology Council, Dept. of Science and technology, Mr. Kekuniel Ltu, Scientist-B. Patent Information Centre, Nagaland Science Technology Council, Dept. of Science and technology, Ms. Gilhukali Chishi, Technical Assistant, Patent Information Centre, Nagaland Science Technology Council, Dept. of Science and technology. After which was followed by a warm welcome address from the Principal, Dr. Ralimongla, Kohima College, Kohima.

In the first technical session, Mr. Kekuniel Ltu, Scientist-B, Patent rmation Centre, NASTEC, Dept. of Science and technology, the resource person highlighted on the Intellectual property rights and its component explaining in detail about IPR and why it's important in academia as well. The components he focused on are patents, trademark, copyright, industrial design, trade secrets, geographical indicator, plant variety protection and farmer's right. In his presentation he informed that the Patent Information Centre, Nagaland was established in 2011, and is the only organization in Nagaland dealing with IPR issues. The IPR support and facilitation centre is set up by the Department of Science and Technology, Government of India and also its linkages with TIFAC, DST-GOI. He also explains the objectives of the centre which are, IPR awareness and consultation among the people in the state; to facilitate universities, industry, governments departments and R&D institutions for patent filing and searches, GI registration, Copyrights, New plant varieties, etc.; IPR cells in Universities' Institute of Higher Educations; and providing free patent searches. Further, he ed that five IPR cells has been set up at:

1. NU-SET, Dimapur under Biotechnology Dept,

the term is 18 years from the date of registration. Trade secret are formula, business information, customer information, methodology, strategic plans, etc. they are commercial, have unlimited duration as long as its secret and this type are automatically granted and no legal action is required. Geographical Indications is a name or sign used on certain products which corresponds to a specific geographical location or origin (eg, a town, region or country). It act as a certification that the product possesses certain qualities, is made according to traditional methods, or enjoys a certain reputation, due to its geographical origin.

The term of protection is 10 years and it can be renewed indefinitely by paying renewal fee.

The second technical session was on copyrights and trademark presented by Ms. Gihukali Chishi, PIC, NASTEC, Dept. of Science and Technology. In her presentation, she explained on copyrights, infringement, trademarks and their categories. Copyright is a form of Intellectual property rights (IPR). It is a bunch of tiple in control of the control o categories. Copyright is a form of increasing project regards which computer rights in certain creative material such as text, artistic works, music, computer programs, sound recordings and films. The copyright owner has the right to control how their material is used. The definition of copyright is it is an exclusive right how their material is used. The definition of copyright is it is an exclusive right given by law for a certain term to an author, composer etc, to print, publish, sell copies etc of his original work. The types of copyright are literary-article, thesis, poem, question papers, dictionary, encyclopedia, head notes, translation, abridgement, lectures, catalogues; artistic – painting, seulpture, drawing, map, chart; musical – music composition, graphical notation; cinematographic film-videos files; sound recording – sound files. The copyrights Act, 1957 is a statutory rights – reproduce in any material, storing in any medium, issue copies, perform, make film or sound recording, translation, adaptation, sell, rental; a moral rights, right to transfer and right against infringement. The term of copyright for original literary, dramatic, musical and artistic works is of 60 years period which is counted from the year following the death of the author. For cinematographic films- sound literary, dramatic, musical and artistic works is of 60 years period which is counted from the year following the death of the author. For cinematographic films-sound recordings, photographs, posthumous publications, anonymous and pseudonymous publications, works of government and works of international organizations – 60 years period which is counted from the date of publication. Performers and broadcasting rights – 25 years. Copyright exist in the expression of the idea in a material form and not just a mere idea. Both published and unpublished work are entitled for copyright. Infringement is unauthorized and illegal reproduction of

Mr. Ltu also mentioned the activities conducted by the department annually Mr. Lu also mentioned the activities conducted by the department annually such as awareness seminar on IPR to schools, colleges, NGOs, entrepreneurs, departments, farmers, etc.; facilitating in patent filing and searches, GI registration, Copyrights, Trademark, New plants varieties, etc.; carrying out patent search through procured database and post GI awareness. In his presentation he furthermore explained that Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) refers broadly to the creations of the human mind, or an intangible property. IPR can be assigned, gifted, sold and licensed like any other property and it have to be renewed from time to time to keep them enforced. And accordance to him brehass this is the only interest into a to decreased like any other property and it have to be renewed from time to time to keep them enforced. And according to him perhaps this is the only right which can be simultaneously enjoyed in more than one country. He also tells us why IPR is important in academia, the role of Intellectual property (IP) is important during teaching, research and outreach activities, R&D collab technology transfer and entrepreneurship. IP gives protection if one create a product, publish a book, or find a new drug, intellectual property rights ensure that one benefits from one's work. These rights protect one's creation or work from unfair use by others. IP creates and support paying jobs, rewards for inventive faculty and staff, enhanced student entrepreneurship and is a new revenue sources. The components he mentions are patents, trademark, copyright, industrial design, trade secrets, geographical indicator, plant variety protection and farmer's right. Patents are exclusive rights granted to an inventor or applicant to make, u sell an invention for a specified number of years. Patent information means that the invention cannot be commercially made, used, distributed or sold without the consent of the owner. Invention may be any product or process or both and it should be novel, involves an inventive step which is not obvious and capable of industrial application and the term is 20 years from the date of filing. He gave a brief overview of traditional knowledge as well. Such as knowledge of indigenous and local communities that has been passed on through generations for its ability to sustain and develop the communities. It includes biological and other materials for medical treatment and agriculture, production processes, designs and literature, rituals and other techniques and arts. Also includes bio-diversity related

knowledge. A case study on turmeric patent was highlighted to make us understand better the rights; in 1995, two Indian nationals at the University of Mississippi Mediacal centre were granted US patent no 5401504 on "use of turmeric in we healing". The Indian Council of Scientific and Industrial Research (CSIR) requested the US patent and trademark office (USPTO) to re-examine the patent CSIR argued that turmeric has been used for thousands of years for healing wounds and rashes and therefore its medicinal use was not novel. Their claim was supported by documentary evidence of traditional knowledge, including an ancient Sanskrit text and a paper published in 1953 in the Journal of the Indian Medical Association. Despite arguments by the patentees, the USPTO uphold the CSIR objections and revoked the patent. As a sequel to turmeric and other TK based patents, CSIR in 1999 and the Department of Ayurveda, Yoga and Naturopathy, Unani, Siddha and Homoeopathy (AYUSH), constituted an inter-disciplinary task force for setting up of Traditional Knowledge Digital Library (TKDL) for cumentation of existing knowledge available in public dom traditional systems of medicine

Copyright is a type of intellectual property that gives its owner the exclusive right to make copies of a creative work. One can copyright the literary works (eg. all text, including computer software); dramatic works, musical and artistic works, motion pictures and other audiovisual works; producers of cinematographic films and sound recordings, architectural works. In case of literary works, the term of protection is lifetime of the owner plus 60 years and in case of artistic works the term is 60 years and for broadcasting, the term is for 25 years. Trademark protect the unique name, design, logo, symbols or colors used by a business to identify their products or services. The term of protection is 10 years and can be renew indefinitely by paying renewal fees. Industrial design relates to feature of shape, configuration, pattern, ornament or composition of lines or colors applied to any article in 2-d or 3-d or both forms. The term of protection is initially for a period of 10 years and can be renewed for another 5 years by paying renewal fees. The protection for semiconductor IC layout designs includes a layout of transistors and other circuitry and includes lead wires connecting such elements. The term is 10 years from the date of filing. The plant variety protection is a system for protection of plant varieties, the rights of farmers and plant breeders and to encourage the development of new varieties of plants. In case of trees and vines,

The last technical session was presented by Dr. Nesatalu Hiese, Scientist-D, PIC, NASTEC, Dept. of Science and Technology, on the topic "Geographical Indication and its opportunities and challenges". In this session, she explained in brief the geographical indication, which is a name or sign used on certain products to protect the unique qualities of a produce that are specific to its geographical origin, the products under GI and also the GI from North East India. GI is a form origin, the products under Gl and also the Gl from North East India. Gl is a form and also a mechanism that helps producers to differentiate their products from others in the market. Gl is also a community rights. Her presentation emphasized on how and why it's important to have our goods and services registered under Gl, and the many benefits that can be reaped in doing so. Gl is important because it enables local populace to derive economic benefit out of their produce, Gl is a marketing tool which benefits farmers and local producers. Its also gives legal protection and prevents from unauthorized use and act as a deferent to prirates and infiringers. This will not only prevent the traditional goods from misuse but also it can gain financial profit by exporting the products to other state/ countries. It also preserves local culture, identity, traditional knowledge and resources. The products under Gl can be agricultural—tea, orange, banana, rice, pepper, coffee, tomato, cucumber, mango flower, natural—marble, clay, coal; foodstaff—laddu, bhujia, fermented bamboo shoot, naga dal; manufacturers—agarbathi, Coimbatore wet grinder, leather, perfume, soop, earther pot; and handicrafts—slik, fabric, shawl, paintings, jewellery, sarces, embroidery, cotton, craft, carving, furniture, toys. The Gl from NE India are Artunachal orange and Idu mishmi textiles from Artunachal Pradesh; Muga silk, Assam orthodox tea, Assam karbi anglong ginger, Tezpur litehi, Joha rice of Assam, Kaji nemu and chikuwa rice of Assam from the state of Assam; and Khasi mandarin and memong narang from Meghalaya. In Nagaland, the chakhesang shawls got Gl registered in 2017. Here 13 shawls and 2 mekhalas are registered which are of only the original ones and not the recent modern design. The benfits of Gl registration are it maintains quality standards of goods, brings-customer trust, fetches premium value of goods, market reach of state, national and international level, employment generation and strategy. The speaker also gave in international le

work of others (whole or part). Makes for sale or hire, fair use does not constitute infringement. Plagiarism is a copyright violation. UGC has brought regulation in 2018 to control it. Any master's, M.Phil, Ph.D student can be penalized for a period of one year if similarities are between 40-6-% and if above 60%, penalized for three years. Trademarks protect the unique name, design, logo, symbols or colors used by a business to identify their products or services. Trademark for three years. Trademark distinguishes goods' services from one manufacturer from the others. The term of protection is 10 years and can be renew indefinitely by paying renewal fees. Certain criteria's for trademarks were also mentioned. Regd proprietor of a trademark can stop other traders from unlawfully using his trade mark, sue for damages and secure destruction of infiniging goods or labels. Purchaser and ultimately consumers gets benefit of trademarks for goods and services. NCI. is an international classification of goods and services profess for the purpose of the registration of marks. 1957 at Nice, France. Trademark also has different application types - service mark - represent the service which a company or business deals in; collective mark- these retribution of marks and product or service, these trademarks are primarily owned by an organization, institute, or any association; Certification mark - the certification mark is created to show a specific quality standard that the company has met and series marks are retrearnately which have a common syllable, prefix or suffix, thus denoting as a family of marks sharing a 'common name'. The speaker further highlighted a trademark infringement case. The Kaira District Co-operate further highlighted a trademark infringement and restrained the two from using Amul trademark. It was concluded that usterly butterly delicious Amul name cannot be used by any other except the proprietor. She also explained further on who can apply and how one can apply with a concluding remark starting protecting your ideal is well worth the time and effort.

After the two speakers gave their presentations, their was a short tea break

In conclusion, the presentation aims to facilitate, educate, capacitate and empowering the various stakeholder on importance of protecting, preserving and promoting the indigenous rights of the people.





The College is registered with NCFE for conducting the FACT programme and NCFE has certified the College for its participation. An e-certification of appreciation is attached to this report.


